

A Message from the Executive

We have also strengthened our environment program area and allocated more than 50% of our funds to support environmental conservation and management efforts. We have successfully implemented the year 1 of our pilot projects on adding value and creating a circular economy for wastes through the ULABS Balik Baterya Program in partnership with Motolite and PBSP, and through the Bote Challenge Project together with the Department of Education.

This year, we launched the Bote Challenge—the foundation's flagship solution search project which addresses PET bottles plastic waste management in the province of Cebu. We introduced 10 winning innovations from our students in public secondary schools and their partner community-based organizations. The project will be scaled to a nationwide level in the years to come.

Lastly, our pledge to protect and rehabilitate the critical watershed areas carries on as we partner with different groups from the private, government, and civil society sectors in the planting and maintenance of 31,500 seedlings. We also take pride in mobilizing almost a thousand of volunteers in various volunteering activities nationwide.

The stories of success in 2019 could not have been weaved without the cooperation, support and inspiration of our team, our partners and other stakeholders. It is with high hopes that together, we can develop more interventions which can create a lasting impact in the lives of our Filipino people.

2 Launch of the Bote Challenge – a signature project for NSFI

In 2019, Nature's Spring Foundation undertook the first ever major campaign to tackle the issue on single-use plastics by launching the first ever Bote Challenge, a one-of-a-kind solution search project which promotes and adopts new or existing innovative solutions for plastic waste management. On its pilot year of implementation, the challenge primarily focused on a search for community solutions for PET bottle waste and opened the competition to secondary schools



in the province of Cebu. Entries were dubbed as school-unities, wherein each school must partner with a community-based group and join forces in creating and implementing the innovative idea.

In its pilot year, about 65 school-unities participated in the challenge. Nature's Spring Foundation, Inc. provided an opportunity for the school-unities to polish their ideas into concrete and sustainable solutions through the series of ideation workshops, in partnership with the Business Fair Trade Consulting. Ten school-unity winners were awarded.

In 2020, the plan for the second phase is to support the winners with further product development, business development, an initial production cycle and links to market of their products or services. Since most of the school-unity winners are startups, having minimal to zero experience on community-based social enterprise, NSFI will continue to provide project support through organizational capacity development, business incubation and other business development ideas that will bring the innovations to market. Within two years, NSFI plans to scale this signature project to a regional and towards a national level in the coming years.

Partnerships as a model for Program Implementation

2019 was also a good year of partnerships for NSFI. In its current operating model, the foundation was designed to operate as a grant-making and co-implementing partner with already existing development agencies and organizations. Hence, its lean staffing model and the focus on partnerships.

In the Education program, it has successfully partnered with the Cebu Technological University (CTU) – an ideal partner that delivered the right level of support given its ten (10) campuses and eleven (11) extensions in the province of Cebu. Partnerships will be strengthened in 2020 for two leading VocTech institutions in Cebu in order to ramp up the vocational scholarship program. Business processes for the selection of scholars will be passed on to implementing partners with additional support provided by NSFI.



The partnerships with DepEd Region 7 for the Bote Challenge was also a success and enabled NSFI to implement the project, despite its challenges. Another successful partnership that delivered by the Balik Baterya Program was with the Philippine Business for Social Progress (PBSP) and the Motolite group of companies. PBSP was also a partner for the Reforestation project at the Central Cebu Protected Landscape (CCPL) and enabled NSFI to jump-start its environmental projects since late 2017. The success of the Balik Baterya Program enabled funding for VocTech educational scholarships for 2020 and will be continued to directly partner with the Motolite group of companies.

Finally, the technical partnership with Business Fair Trade Consulting (BizFTC) was also instrumental in providing support services to the Bote Challenge participants from the inception workshops, to the development of prototypes for the schoolunity entries. Continued support for bringing product innovations to market and sustain the business operations of the Bote Challenge winners will be key. Also, exploring further opportunities to partner with the Liter of Light Foundation with the Bote Challenge is being scaled in the near future. Finally, NSFI's membership to the League of Corporate Foundations (LCF) will also be an opportunity to learn and partner with likeminded nonprofits and corporate foundations in pursuing shared goals and outcomes.

NSFI's Program Footprint

In 2019, the projects of NSFI across the three program areas have also resulted in a gradual expansion of its reach in the cities of Cebu and Mandaue as well as the province of Cebu, in general. This is part of its approach of starting small, increasing its relevance, and being where it is needed most in the near future. Below shows the program site locations for NSFI's projects in 2019:



Figure 1: Location of Project Interventions in the country









Figure 2: Location of project interventions in Cebu Province

PROJECT 1 **COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP ASSISTANCE** PROGRAM (CSAP)



In many parts of the country, the children and youth struggle in achieving a better quality education due to poverty and the lack of child support as major hindrance to their dreams. This is why the scholarship program remains at the forefront of the Education Program Area. We wanted to provide not only a scholarship, but to give the full support that these underprivileged yet deserving students need for their personal and career growth.

In 2 years' time Nature's Spring Foundation has provided support to 23 scholars who are enrolled in both private and state universities in the province

of Cebu. Most of the scholars' courses are education, agriculture, industrial engineering/technology, business administration, accountancy, and hospitality management.

The program piloted in 2018 while giving priority to the applicants in Mandaue City. Seven scholars were selected for the pioneer batch of the year. They are enrolled in Cebu Technological University (CTU), with 5 scholars coming from the CTU main campus and another 2 from the CTU Argao campus.

By 2019, NSFI expanded its scholarship opportunities in the entire Cebu Province





and also catered to Alternative Learning System (ALS) completers. A total of 17 scholars completed the second batch of NSFI scholars. The scholars come from different cities and municipalities in the Province of Cebu such as Argao, Asturias, Dalaguete, Tabogon, Carcar City, Danao City, Mandaue City, Lapu-lapu City and Cebu City.

One of the key successes of the year 2019 was its partnership building with the Cebu Technological University (CTU) which provided an extensive reach of scholars through its 10 campuses and 11 extensions in the province. Majority of the scholars are enrolled in CTU through the program. The partnership has also provided a platform for the scholars and other students to be exposed and engaged in various civic volunteering efforts of the foundation.

Nature's Spring Foundation commits to its quality standards in the whole of its screening and selection process. As qualification, the applicant should





be a graduate of Senior High School with an average of 85% or higher, and the combined family annual income should not exceed to 150,000 PHP. The selection process includes pre-screening, examination, interview, and social investigation. The applicant has to pass each step to qualify for the scholarship. During the scholarship term, NSFI provides miscellaneous/tuition fees for students enrolled in private school while uniform, book and project allowance, and boarding house/transportation allowance for scholars enrolled in state university.





PROJECT 2

VOCATIONAL AND TECHNICAL SKILLS SCHOLARSHIPS (VOCTECH SCHOLARSHIPS)

Aside from the College Scholarship Program, NSFI also provides scholarships to students who pursue vocational and technical tracks for employment. In 2018, four scholars graduated in automotive with National Certification (NC) I & II from the College of Technological Science in Cebu and experienced their on-thejob training (OJT) at the Philippine Spring Water Resources Incorporated (PSWRI), the mother company of NSFI. As scholars, they are provided with tuition & miscellaneous fees, uniform, meal and transportation allowance.

In 2019, seven automotive students from Sisters of Mary (SOM) Boystown Minglanilla in Cebu were selected to have their OJT in PSWRI as first step for possible partnership between the SOM automotive program and NSFI for the VocTech Scholarship Project.

Opportunities for 2020

Fifteen students will be selected from two partner schools in Cebu for Voctech Scholarships.





PROJECT 3 MANDAUE CITY-WIDE TRAINING FOR TEACHERS

Nature's Spring Foundation partnered with DepEd Mandaue City Division for its pilot implementation in providing trainings to our educators. About 315 newly hired teachers from the different elementary and secondary schools in Mandaue City attended the three-day Teachers' Induction Program on July 18-

20 and 25-27, 2018. The teachers learned about the DepEd strategic direction, Government basic Education Act, Professional Standard for Teachers, and Government Compliance. The training was facilitated by DepEd Mandaue Division while NSFI provided for the training materials and meals.


PROJECT 4 SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (SIP)

The School Improvement Program is one of the foundation's initiative in fostering stronger and dynamic ties with the education sector to fill the gap and sustain the needs of every public school, be it elementary or secondary, to ensure quality education for every learner. The first 2 years of its implementation focused on the development of the schools in Mandaue City, the home of its mother company PSWRI, and has deepen its relationship with its partner schools since

The Department of Education established the Alternative Learning System (ALS) nationwide to provide an access of Out-of-School Youths (OSYs) to formal education and give them opportunities to complete basic and secondary education. In Mandaue City, the ALS Community Learning Centers are constantly faced with challenges on the access of comfortable learning facilities for the out-of-school youth. Educators from the ALS Centers addressed chairs as one of their lacking resource with its growing number of OSY enrolees.

Together with the generosity of a partner company, the Lockheart Management Development Corporation (LMDC), 250 armchairs were donated for the Alternative Learning System (ALS) Community Center through the foundation in the last quarter of 2018. Nature's Spring Foundation, together with LMDC and DepEd Mandaue City Division signed the Memorandum of Agreement for the turn-over of 250 armchairs to the six selected ALS Community Learning Centers on December 19, 2018.



The turn-over ceremony was held in each Community Learning Center on January 22 & 25, 2019 and participated by representatives from DepEd Mandaue City Division, Lockheart Management Development Corp, Nature's Spring Foundation, Inc., Barangay Officials, ALS Mobile Teachers and learners. The beneficiaries are ALS Community Learning Centers of Barangay Cambaro, Looc, Subangdaku, Jagobia, Pagsabungan, and Tingub.

PROJECT 5 SCHOOL SUPPLIES DISTRIBUTION

The Swap-up project is one of the foundation's initiative in promoting a culture of waste education to young learners and their families. The strategy aims to gather a kilo of used PET bottles for every student and exchange it for a pack of school supplies (content for one pack: writing notebooks - 8 pcs, pencils -6 pcs, crayon, plastic envelop, glue, ruler, and pad papers – 10 pads). The PET bottles were sold with half of its proceeds used as funding for the sustainable livelihood

project of the school's PTCA. A total of 171 pupils of Umapad Elementary School, Mandaue City were given school supplies in exchange for approximately 205 kilos of PET empty bottles on June 14, 2018.

On December 15, 2018, 59 students in Mulao Elementary School and 109 students in Tabla Elementary School from Grades 1 to 3 in the town of Liloan, Cebu have also received schools supplies through the Swap-up Project.

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PROJECT 1 DIABETES AWARENESS AND MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

Diabetes affects millions of Filipinos annually. About 1 out of 5 Filipinos are either diagnosed with the disease or has signs of pre-diabetes, and lifestyle is a major cause. As an effort to curb down the numbers, NSFI launched the Diabetes Awareness and Management Program to support Diabetes patients in underserved communities and implement awareness and knowledge capacity building activities on the disease and its prevention.

As a launch, the Diabetes Testing and Awareness was conducted to the employees of NSFI's mother company,

PSWRI, in its Cebu Headquarters Office on November 2017 and August 14, 2018. This effort is a pilot implementation to raise the level of awareness among the employees and its community. After the diabetes testing, a total of 40 employees were provided with intervention from the PSWRI since 2017 until 2019.

Opportunities for 2020

The foundation aims to strengthen its diabetes management program in the next year to include a proposed monthlong celebrations and campaign in November 2020.


In 2019, 96 employees of PSWRI nationwide were affected by fire, typhoon, and earthquake. From these employees, 6 are fire victims, 71 are earthquake victims while 19 are victims of massive floods caused by a typhoon that damaged their homes. About 26 employees were also provided with assistance during the typhoon Josie which hit Northern Luzon in July 24, 2018.

Since 2017, a total of 134 employees of PSWRI nationwide received an emergency assistance from the foundation to restoration and recovery of their properties affected by the typhoon.





PROJECT 3 MEDICAL ASSISTANCE



Medical assistance to PSWRI employees with severe and complicated disease

Nature's Spring Foundation has also provided support to PSWRI employees who are struggling with severe and complicated diseases. In 2018 up to this date, NSFI provided medical assistance for the biweekly dialysis treatment to an employee who was diagnosed to have dilated cardiomyopathy with severely depressed and hypertensive cardiovascular disease and has to undergo twice a week of hemodialysis treatment for lifetime. A family member of another employee who was diagnosed to have Guillain barré syndrome was also provided with medical assistance on that same year.

PROJECT 4 SAFE WATER DRINKING PROJECT

Nature's Spring Foundation Inc. continues to provide safe, quality and free drinking water to activities that focuses on volunteerism aligned to its core program areas. In 2018, a total of 11,506 bottled waters were donated to different non-government organizations (NGOs) and People's Organizations (POs) for medical and dental missions, environment protection and disaster-related emergencies within the Province of Cebu.

As the foundation begins to establish its name, different NGOs and People's Organizations were able to access the bottled water donations. In 2019 total of 54,492 bottled waters were donated to Local Government Units (LGUs) for the families affected by calamities such as fire and typhoons, to NGOs and People's Organization implementing medical or dental missions and environmental conservation activities in the different areas of the Philippines.

PROJECT 1 THE BOTE CHALLENGE

2019 marked a new wave for Nature's Spring Foundation when it started the Bote Challenge—the foundation's flagship environmental project—an initiative which sought the need to contribute to the global movement of closing the loop on plastic pollution, creating a circular economy for plastic and fostering a culture of upcycling/recycling within communities.

The Bote Challenge is a solution search project which recognizes, promotes and adopts new or existing innovative solutions for plastic waste management. On its pilot year of implementation, the challenge primarily focused on sustainable practices for PET bottles and opened the competition to secondary schools in the province of Cebu. Entries were dubbed as school-unities, in which each school must partner with community-based organizations (CBOs) to join force in creating and implementing the innovative idea.

In 2019, about 65 school-unities participated the challenge. Nature's Spring Foundation opened an opportunity for the school-unities to polish their ideas into concrete and sustainable solutions through the series of ideation workshops, in partnership with the Business Fair Trade Consulting. Ten school-unity winners were awarded.

The second phase of the project will start on 2020 wherein the innovations of the winners will be upscaled into viable market products or services. Since most of the school-unity winners are startups,





Pesos of accumulated funds for education and socio-economic projects

The Balik Baterya program is an initiative participated by Nature's Spring Foundation Inc. which addresses the harmful effects of Used Lead Acid Batteries (ULABs) to the environment by reprocessing and reusing the ULABs and creating a financial resource to implement education and socioeconomic projects in communities. The partnership with Oriental and Motolite Marketing Corporation and the Philippine Business for Social Progress (PBSP) commenced in 2018 when NSFI teamed up with PSWRI, in recycling the ULABS of its mother company and generate income which will be donated as proceeds for the community projects.

Through the dedicated efforts of its stakeholders, NSFI was able to raise 366,000 PHP worth of project funds out from the 12.4 tons of ULABs hauled from the four plants of PSWRI—Laguna Plant, Bulacan Plant, Cebu Plant and Davao Plant. With the total proceeds, NSFI together with PBSP will implement a scholarship program in 2020 to fund the education of an estimated 30 students coming from the underprivileged communities in the Province of Cebu.

PROJECT 3 REFORESTATION PROJECT

Recognizing its vital role in promoting environmental stewardship, Nature's Spring Foundation, Inc. tirelessly commits to bring adopt-a-watershed projects at the forefront of its core programs in ensuring environmental sustainability for the country. At the very start of our operations in 2018, we have partnered with a number of government and private entities in implementing forest reforestation projects.

On top of the list is our partnership with PBSP for the Reforestation Project. The ongoing reforestation project with PBSP is the commitment of the foundation to rehabilitate the largest and most critical Watershed Reserve in Cebu—the Central Cebu Protected Landscape. From 2018 to 2019, the project has yielded 10,000 seedlings in 4 hectares with an initial 70% of survival rate. The project also involved the community-based organization,

Aside from PBSP, Nature's Spring Foundation, Inc. has also collaborated with LGU Bulacan, Briguettors Association of the Philippines and PSWRI Bulacan to plant and maintain 2,500 seedlings in San Mateo, Morzagaray, Bulacan and with Borbon Tree Farmers Association and Cebu Environment and Natural Resources Office for the planting of 19,500 seedlings in Poblacion, Borbon, Cebu in 2018.

In the next years to come, the foundation looks forward to expand its reach to the different areas different areas that are heavily forested in the country, and implement a nationwide scale of reforestation as its commitment to ensure environmental conservation.



PROJECT 4 **DISASTER RESILIENCE PROJECT**

In the data provided by the Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office (PDRRMO), the El Niño phenomenon which affected Cebu from April to June 2019 was considered as the longest and worst El Niño in the last decade. The calamity posed a threat to farmers—crops damaged and livestock died from dehydration especially in the southern part of Cebu. The Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office of Cebu reported a total of 121 million pesos worth of damage to agricultural crops.

In response to the disaster caused by the calamity, NSFI partnered with the PDRRMO to support the farmers coming from the municipalities which were greatly affected by El Niño. Farmers from far-flung areas in Boljoon and Alcoy were identified to be the most severely affected by the calamity, based from the data provided by the PDRRMO.

Through the assistance of the Municipal Disaster Risk Reduction and Management in Boljoon, the foundation donated 1,020 Liters of Purified Drinking Water and


aimed at engaging stakeholders on discussions related to how the environment affects water resources such as natural watersheds and waterways.

INTERNATIONAL COASTAL CLEAN-UP 2019



The year has also provided an opportunity for the foundation to mobilize volunteers during its second participation to the International Coastal Clean-up Day on September 19, 2019. A total of 688 volunteers from the towns of Argao, Malabuyoc, Oslob, Tuburan and Tabogon which mostly consists of teachers and students, local government officials, private business owners, employees from PSWRI and affiliate companies, and even tourists in the area. The international coastal clean-up is the largest volunteer activity for the environment conducted every third Saturday of the month wherein people gather to clean coastlines and water bodies from around the world and contribute to the international trash data from the Ocean Conservancy, reducing trash at source and changing behavior that allow trash into the water at the first place.




The products are Bote Tiles, which the school named Bote Ti, is made from manual shredding of 25 PET bottles (per tile). The tiles are made out of 30% cement and chicken wire. This innovation is an alternative or cheaper substitute to the commonly used ceramic tiles, and can be used in the flooring of aisles, pathways.

The school linked with Purok Villadolid, a group of women initially organized as 4Ps beneficiaries of DSWD for the training, production and market of the product.

ROBERTO E. SATO MEMORIAL NATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL (5th place)

Calidngan, Carcar City

The Concrete Eco Pot is a natural and durable pot which offers a cheaper alternative to the common ceramic and clay pots available in the market. Each concrete eco-pot is made out of limestone, cement and 100 grams of shredded plastic bottle. Roberto Sato Memorial National High School established a Memorandum of Agreement with the Lunas, Latab, Calidngan Pit-os United Farmers Association (LULACAPIUFA) for the partnership of the production of the Ecopots.





TOLEDO CITY SCIENCE HIGH SCHOOL (7th place)

Ilihan Heights, Toledo City

Alternative Plastic Water Pipeline for Domestic use is limited only to solve the water scarcity in the domestic homes and agricultural farmlands. The product has three main parts: the pipeline composed of 1 liter bottles, the outer shell which is made up of 10 liter bottles, and the inner layer which is reinforced with Ecobricks. Toledo City Science High School connected with the Ambassador for Christ Youth Organization, a Toledo-based organization, in upscaling the product.

JOVENCIO N. MASONG NATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL (8th place)

Panabilan, Bogo City

The product, called the Eco-bote Relax Ware, is a lounge chair filled with PET bottles. The concept of Jovencio N. Masong National High School is to partner with the Purok Mablaw Furniture Makers Association in fabricating the Lounge Chair. Each one-seater Ecobote Relax Ware is filled with 50 pieces of 500 mL PET bottles. The school has started receiving orders from clients and customized the design of every product according to every client's preferences.



SABANG NATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL (9th place)

Sabang, Danao City

Sabang NHS focuses on a service innovation with a concept of creating a barter system of PET bottles, in exchange with basic goods like laundry products, food items, and load. The strategy is to have a home-based collection, which will include offices, schools, and other companies and organizations, given that Barangay Sabang is populated with workers coming from industries. The school partners with the communitybased organization, Sabang Productive Youth Organization.





ANONANG SUR TABACO FRASCO NATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL (10th place)

Anonang Sur, Bogo City

The product is a packaged Dextrose Gardening kit, an innovation that addresses water crisis in their barangay. These supply life to the plants without wasting water. Also, it helps the environment in terms of disposing the PET bottles.

The liquid mixture poured inside the bottle functions as in irrigation and fertilizer for the plant with carefully calculated concoction of water and organic fertilizers such as fermented plant juice and fish amino acid. In partnership with the Women's Community Association organized by DSWD-MCCT in Bogo City, Anonang Sur Tabaco NHS plants to Anonang Sur Tabaco National High School plans to upscale and expand more of their product-service by modifying the form of the bottles and changing the liquid mixture, and providing maintenance service that would meet the needs of the customer for their farm or garden.
